
HERBERT POK DONG CHO "E" Company (Long Range Patrol), 50th Infantry, 9th Infantry Division Staff Sergeant, E6, US56705602, MOS 11B40 Home of Record: Lynwood, CA, Born: Honolulu, HI. Staff Sergeant Herb Cho was drafted when his exempt status was not renewed by the Los Angeles Police and Probation departments in error. Although he could have opted out of military service, he chose to enter the service when he received his Selective Service Draft notice. An exceptional soldier, he had taught martial arts to the LAPD and was quick to gain rank in the US Army...reaching the E-6 level in less than 2 years.

On 16 December, 1967, he graduated from the NCOC Course at Fort Benning, Georgia, Class 4-67, and deployed to South Vietnam where he joined Company E (Long Range Patrol), 50th Infantry, 9th Infantry Division.



During the period from August through October, SSG Cho's 8-man LRP team was working out of Dong Tam and often teamed with the Provincial Reconnaissance Units (PRU). The PRU troops contained personnel from the Central Intelligence Agency's Project Phoenix program. The PRU were hardened anticommunist troops dedicated to destroying the Viet Cong infrastructure and generally possessed very high esprit and great knowledge of Viet Cong operating methods.⁽¹⁾



At approximately 9:00 AM on the morning of 25 September 1968, SSG Cho's LRP team and a PRU team were moving near the large Dong Tam Base Camp when a booby trapped **Claymore Mine was detonated**, Cho killing and severely wounding 3 other LRP and 1 PRU men. One of those PFC Robert wounded. Loehlein died later that day of wounds. Loehlein his was posthumously promoted to Corporal.⁽²⁾
