## STEVEN EDWARD COLLIER




Sergeant Steven Collier was reported to have served in several capacities as a member of Company F (Long Range Patrol), 50th Infantry.

Former Cobra 1-5 Team Leader Staff Sergeant Michael Soetaert reports Collier as his Assistant Team Leader (Likely Summer/Fall of 1967)...while After Action Reports from the period show Collier as Assistant Team Leader for Team Cobra 2-1 in early 1968 and as Team Leader in July of 1968.

A passage in the book "Rangers at War" by Shelby Stanton, describes the tactical SOP for the period between August and November of 1968:


"In August of 1968, Major General Ellis W. Williamson took over the 25th Infantry Division. He redirected Company F operations toward gathering information





"Dusk was a risky time for the Long Range Patrol teams. We had to assume that the VC knew where we were...and if we lingered too long, we were likely to be hit by the enemy in force. To avoid this...just as it was getting dark, we would move to another location for the night. On October 27th, 1968, both my Team 2-2 and Collier's Team 2-1 were operating on opposite sides of the Saigon River...with probably less than a click (1000 meters) between us. Just as my team was moving into our night position, we heard a brief, maybe 10 second, eruption of small arms and automatic weapons fire....then silence. I was hoping this was simply an enemy "recon by fire" where they would suspect a team was located nearby and just open fire...hoping the LRP Team would return fire and reveal their positions. Unfortunately, this was not the case...as my friend Collier's team was ambushed and I heard the call come over the Company frequency that he was KIA."
