Shortly after Noon on July 27th, Joseph Franckowiak was killed when a grenade he was carrying exploded. 3 others were wounded in the blast.






At the time, "B" Company was working with "A" Company, 1st Battalion, 503rd Infantry and the 41st ARVN Regiment (Located well to our South) in a combined operation that began on the 26th of July. Former B Company Squad leader Terry Goodwin remembers: "On the 26th, "B" Company had entered the area via Helicopter Combat Assault at Map Coordinates BR745648 (See Map Below)....this was late in the morning. I was on the first bird (helicopter) down and the area was covered with elephant grass. Once the LZ was secured, we




moved to the East up a ridge toward the top of the mountain. That night we dug in on the ridge. The next day we resumed our march up the mountain and this was the day that Franckowiak's grenade went off. I am pretty sure he was in the 2nd Squad of the 1st Platoon."
