PFC Al Gutierrez was killed in action when the bridge his platoon was guarding was attacked by a North Vietnamese Army Unit estimated to be a reinforced Platoon. His position was compromised by a direct hit from a B-40 Rocket in the initial volley of enemy fire and he was killed instantly. Also involved in the fighting were elements of the 50<sup>th</sup> Infantry's Scout Platoon. A portion of the bridge was overrun and the fighting included "hand to hand" combat at times. The Scouts were able to withdrawal carrying 6 men who were wounded. Reinforcements arrived and the bridge was retaken. Also killed in this hostile action were 1LT Dan Abernathy and Sergeant Thomas F. Herkins.




A map of the location of Bridge #26 (BR288454) is shown below,

4 SEPTEMBER 1968

FOR HEROISM IN CONNECTION WITH MILITARY OPERATIONS AGAINST A HOSTILE FORCE. PRIVATE GUTIERREZ DISTINGUISHED HIMSELF ON 24 AUGUST 1968 IN THE REPUBLIC OF VIETNAM. ON THIS DAY PRIVATE GUTIERREZ AND THE OTHER MEMBERS OF HIS SQUAD WERE SERVING ON BRIDGE SECURITY DUTY ON HIGHWAY 19, JUST EAST OF THE MANG YANG PASS IN BINH DINH PROVINCE. AT 0245 HOURS, ON THE MOONLESS AND WINDY NIGHT OF 24 AUGUST 1968, AN ESTIMATED REINFORCED ENEMY PLATOON ATTACKED PRIVATE GUTIERREZ' POSITION WITH A HEAVY BARRAGE OF SMALL ARMS AND ROCKET FIRE. AT THE INITIATION OF THE ATTACK, PRIVATE GUTIERREZ MOVED UNHESITATINGLY INTO THE OPEN TO AWAKEN MEMBERS OF HIS SQUAD. HE THEN RETURNED TO HIS BUNKER AND BEGAN TO PLACE A HEAVY VOLUME OF EFFECTIVE FIRE ONTO THE ENEMY. AS ROCKET FIRE INCREASED, PRIVATE GUTIERREZ' BUNKER TOOK A DIRECT HIT AND HE WAS MORTALLY WOUNDED BY SHRAPNEL. HIS UNSELFISH ACTIONS CONTRIBUTED IN SAVING THE LIVES OF MEMBERS OF HIS SQUAD. PRIVATE GUTIERREZ' PERSONAL BRAVERY AND DEVOTION TO DUTY WERE IN KEEPING WITH THE HIGHEST TRADITIONS OF THE MILITARY SERVICE AND REFLECT GREAT CREDIT ON HIMSELF, HIS UNIT, AND THE UNITED STATES ARMY.
