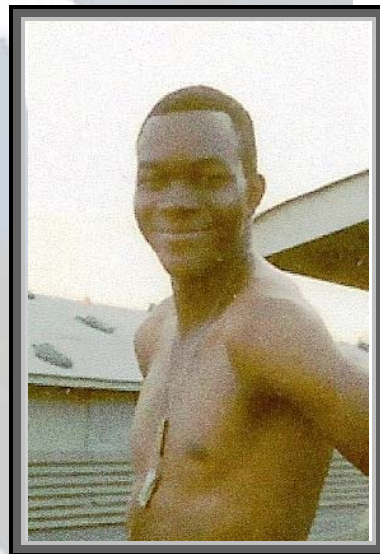

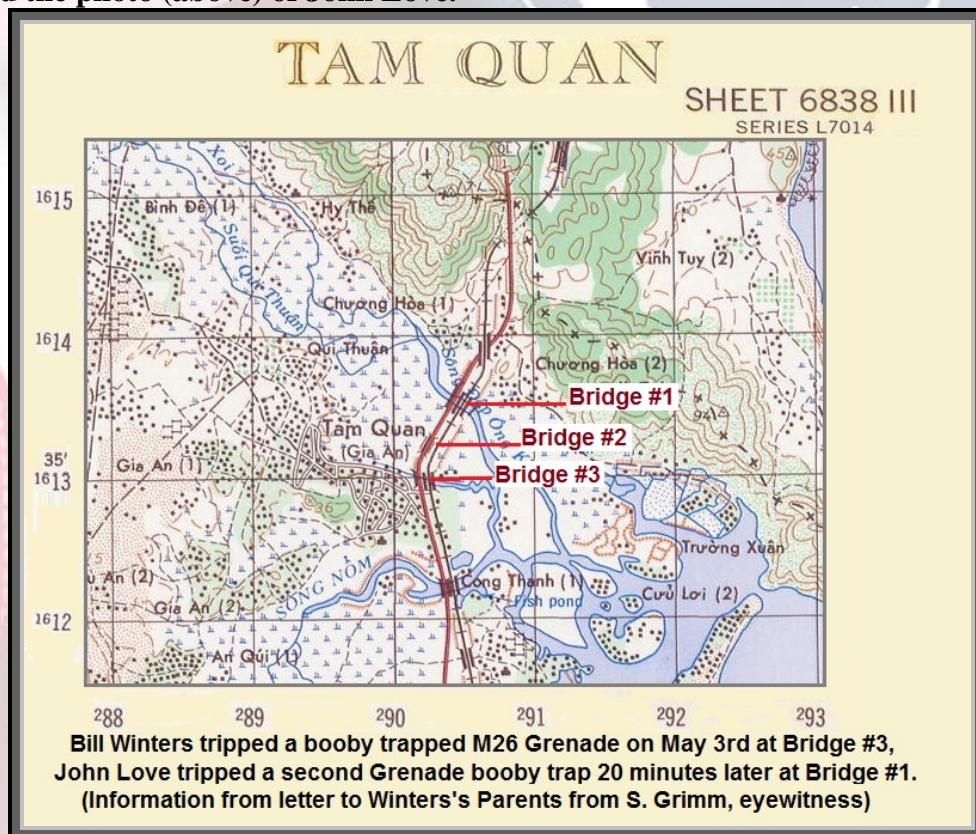

At the time of his death, John Love was with the 3rd Platoon of Charlie Company, which was split from the Battalion Proper and under the Operational Control of the 4th Battalion, 503rd Infantry. The Platoon was responsible for Bridge Security between LZ Lowboy, just north of Tam Quan, and LZ English to the south.

A 4th/503rd Battalion Quarterly Historical Report reveals that 3 individuals were wounded by a booby-trapped M26 Grenade on May 3rd while on Bridge Security near Tam Quan. Also wounded on May 3rd was Bill Winters. This information was confirmed in a personal letter written by a member of Winters's Squad, Shirl W. Grimm, who wrote to Winters's parents after his death, specifically mentioning May 3rd in his letter.



Grimm further wrote that although these two men were reported wounded together...they were wounded by identical booby traps within 20 minutes of each other...but at two different locations. Apparently, all wounded were picked up together...and reported as one incident. Winters died of his wounds on May 14th. John Love also died of his wounds on May 13th. Former 3rd Platoon member Luciano Garza provided the photo (above) of John Love.

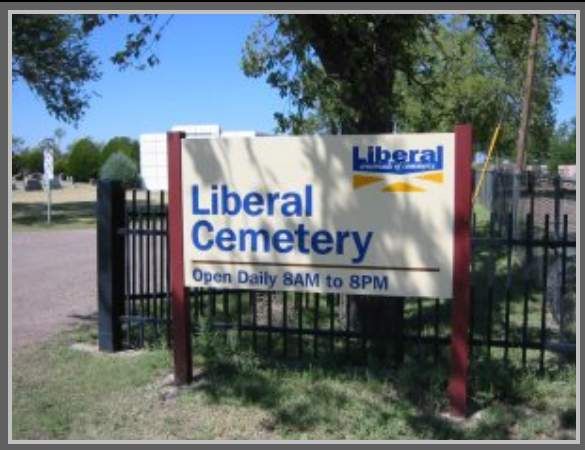

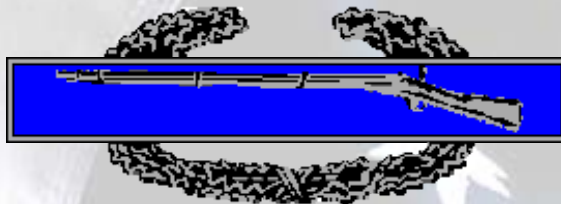


John Love is buried at Liberal Cemetery (Pictured below), West 15th Street, Liberal, Seward County, Kansas.

HE WAS QUICK TO GRASP THE IMPLICATIONS OF NEW PROBLEMS WITH WHICH HE WAS FACED AS A RESULT OF THE EVER-CHANGING SITUATIONS INHERENT IN THE COUNTERINSURGENCY OPERATION AND TO FIND WAYS AND MEANS TO SOLVE THOSE PROBLEMS.
