
At noon, on May 5, 1/50th "A" Company forces were attacked and outnumbered 10 to 1 by a regiment of the North Vietnamese Army. "A" Company forces were overrun and took heavy casualties when Charlie Company was called in to reinforce the besieged Alpha Company. Upon arrival, the enemy, who had fallen silent to allow the "C" Company troops to enter the ambush zone, opened fire with an intense and sustained barrage of small arms, automatic weapons and B40 Rocket fire from three sides.



Fierce fighting ensued on both 1/50th Companies and additional reinforcements from "B" Company, 1/50th

Infantry and "B" Company, 1/69th Armor were called in to battle the huge enemy force.

Don, it doesn't seem like it's been close to forty years We received the word of our worst and greatest fears, And your mother began to shed a river of many tears.

Forty years ago today we got that dreaded telegram, That you died and gave your life far away in Vietnam So many times I've ask,"Did anyone even give a damn?"

Maybe you saved only one life, but probably many more. Only God knows what happened there, forty years before, Thousands of miles from home in that crazy, stupid war.


But forty years later, I'm as honored as any man can be, Because forty years earlier you fought to make men free. You helped make this world a little safer for men like me.

HQ 173rd Airborne Brigade (Separate) General Orders Number 1464

26 MAY 1968

CORPORAL DONALD LOWE DISTINGUISHED HIMSELF BY OUTSTANDING MERITORIOUS SERVICE IN CONNECTION WITH GROUND OPERATIONS AGAINST A HOSTILE FORCE IN THE REPUBLIC OF VIETNAM DURING THE PERIOD FROM JANUARY, 1968, TO MAY, 1968. THROUGH HIS UNTIRING EFFORTS AND PROFESSIONAL ABILITY, HE CONSISTENTLY OBTAINED OUTSTANDING RESULTS. HE WAS QUICK TO GRASP THE IMPLICATIONS OF NEW PROBLEMS WITH WHICH HE WAS FACED AS A RESULT OF THE EVER-CHANGING SITUATIONS INHERENT IN THE COUNTERINSURGENCY OPERATION AND TO FIND WAYS AND MEANS TO SOLVE THOSE PROBLEMS. THE ENERGETIC APPLICATION OF THIS EXTENSIVE KNOWLEDGE HAS MATERIALLY CONTRIBUTED TO THE EFFORTS OF THE UNITED STATES MISSION TO THE REPUBLIC OF VIETNAM TO ASSIST THAT COUNTRY IN RIDDING ITSELF OF THE COMMUNIST THREAT TO ITS FREEDOM.
