SGT Thomas Lukes was killed In Action on July 13, 1968, near base of Cay Giep Mountain south of Bong Son in Binh Dinh Province (See map below). The Battalion History for the period stated:


"Two men from "A" Company were killed by a pressure detonated mine in the vicinity of BR937862. The mine was suspected to have been a 105mm Artillery Shell rigged with a pressure detonating device".

Former "A" Company man Glen Nicholls remembers: "I was not there, but remember those who were stating that they thought the mine might have been much larger than a 105 round. The blast killed the two men immediately...they did not suffer".



Also killed in the blast was SP4 Ronald Pillow.
