

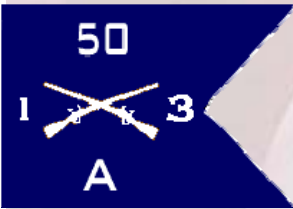

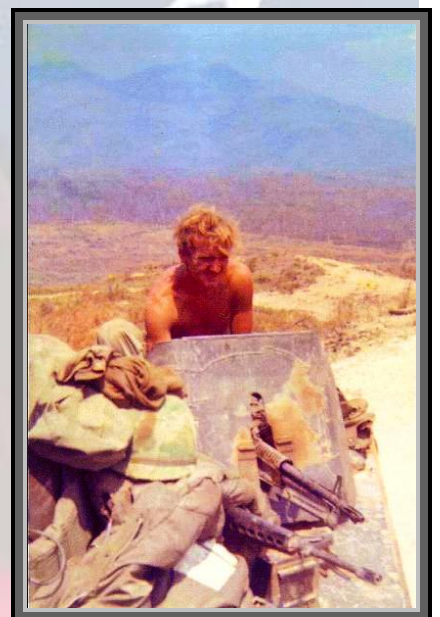
Byron McQuinn was killed in action when Charlie Company's Third Platoon went to reinforce the Scout Platoon which had come under attack approximately 1500 meters Southwest of Strong Point 12 on Highway 19 West of An Khe. The Daily Staff Journal of the 173rd Airborne Brigade for the date reads:

"At 13:39 PM: While maneuvering toward the contact area of their Scout element, they received heavy small arms fire from an unknown size enemy force resulting in 1 U.S. Soldier Killed in Action and 1 Wounded. 3 VC/NVA KIA (Poss)"

"A" Company's Jack Noble wrote:

"Alabama (Specialist Johnny Haynes) of the 3rd Platoon was the point man. He was wounded in the initial volley and I went to recover him. McQuinn was killed while covering us."

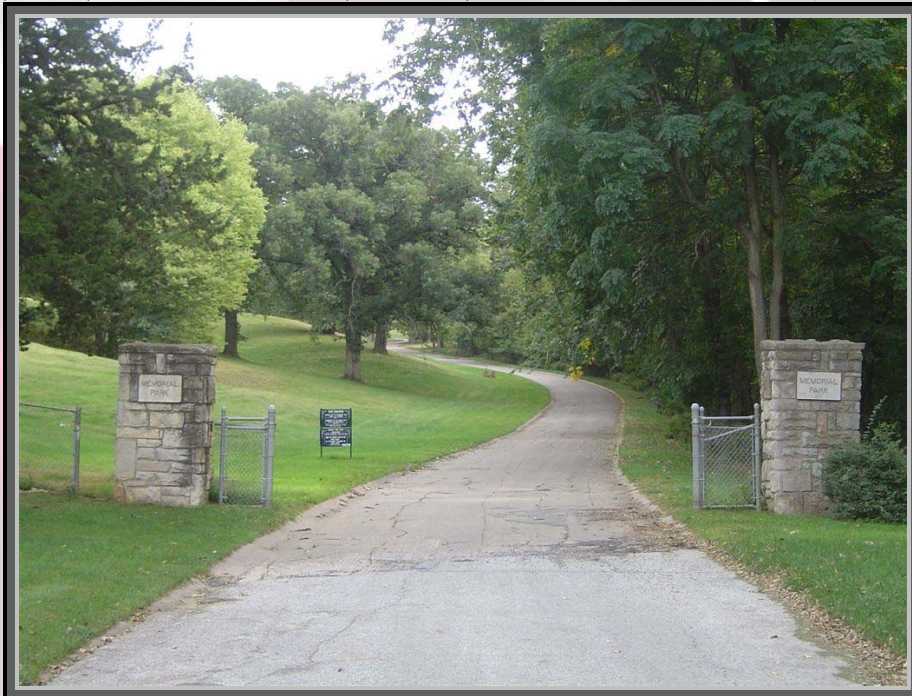

The McQuinn family lost it's second son to the Vietnam war when Byron was killed. Brother Leonard Lloyd McQuinn, Jr. was KIA on 5 September 1966....possibly causing younger brother Byron to enlist. The brothers are both buried in the family plot at Memorial Park Cemetery.
