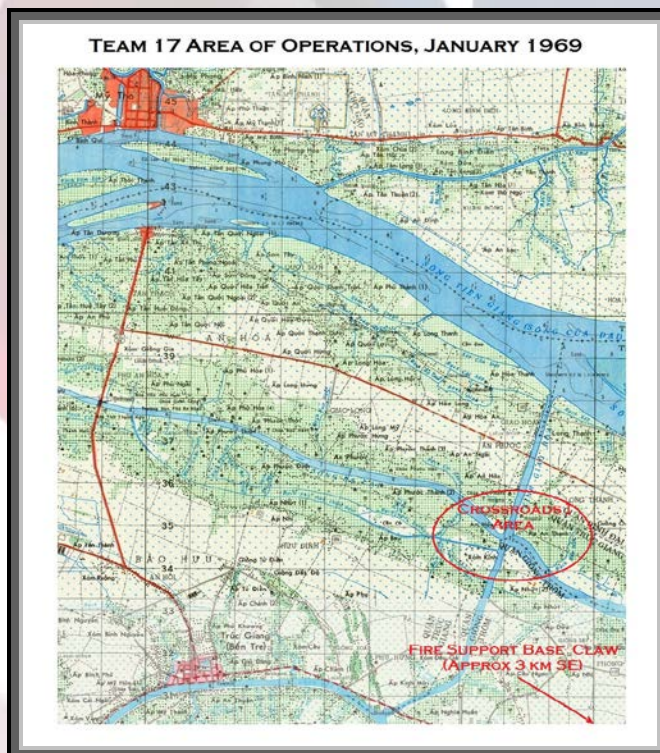
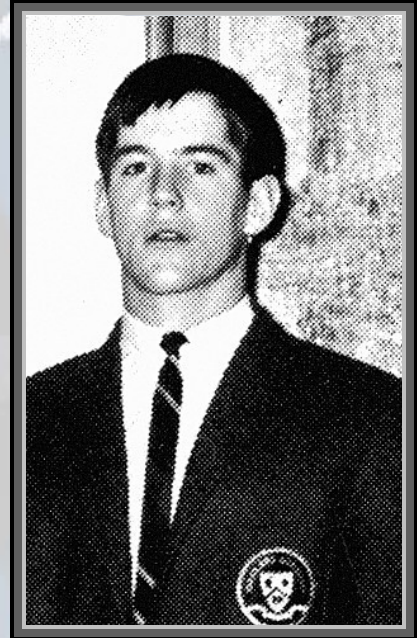
Specialists Leon Moore and Roman Mason were both killed by small arms fire while on a combat mission. Another member of the Long Range Patrol Company was also killed on that day, First Lieutenant Richard Thompson, who was killed by a hand grenade explosion. Specialist Mason, known by High School friends as "Duke" and by his fellow Long Range Patrollers as "Speed" was posthumously promoted to Sergeant, E5.

"E" Company was in it's last days utilizing the 50th Infantry Designation. As of February 1st, 1969, the unit would be known as Company "E", 75th Rangers.

The three men Killed on January 27th were members of Team 17 with their Team Leader being Sergeant Richard Ehrler. They worked with the 2nd Brigade and the Mobile Riverine Force. 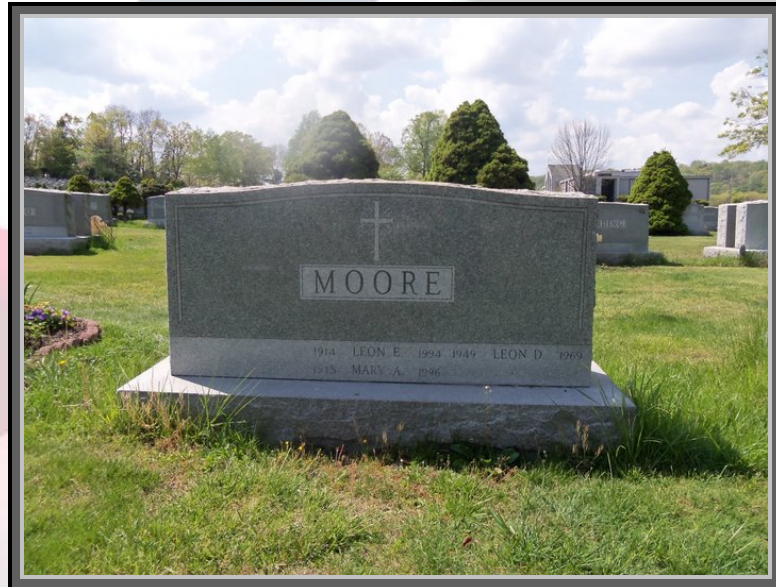

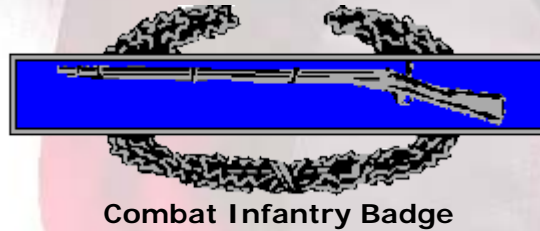
