Jim Morrissey was killed during an ambush along the infamous Route 19 in the Central Highlands of Vietnam's Binh Dinh Province on December 29th, 1968.

The Armored Personnel carriers were in the habit of heading out from the huge An Khe Base Camp to reinforce several of the Bridges along this route...which were guarded by 50th Infantry Elements during our time with the 173rd Airborne from summer of 1968 until spring of 1969...every evening just before dark.





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Battalion After Action Reports show that the lessons learned from this tragic ambush would prove valuable in preventing a repeat of the events. The Battalion learned that sending these reinforcement element out right before dark left no margin for the unforeseen. Also, the habit of departing every day at the same time...around 7 pm...was deadly. The Communist forces always looked for patterns. As Infantrymen, we learned early not to set up in the field in the same place more than one night in a row. After Morrissey's death all 50th Infantry elements were directed to vary their time of departure for these bridge fortifications...and to set out well before dark as well.

GENERAL ORDERS

JANUARY 1969

CORPORAL JAMES JOSEPH MORRISSEY DISTINGUISHED HIMSELF BY OUTSTANDING MERITORIOUS SERVICE IN CONNECTION WITH GROUND OPERATIONS AGAINST A HOSTILE FORCE IN THE REPUBLIC OF VIETNAM DURING THE PERIOD FROM 21 SEPTEMBER 1968 TO 29 DECEMBER 1968. THROUGH HIS UNTIRING EFFORTS AND PROFESSIONAL ABILITY, HE CONSISTENTLY OBTAINED OUTSTANDING RESULTS. HE WAS QUICK TO GRASP THE IMPLICATIONS OF NEW PROBLEMS WITH WHICH HE WAS FACED AS A RESULT OF THE EVER-CHANGING SITUATIONS INHERENT IN THE COUNTERINSURGENCY OPERATION AND TO FIND WAYS AND MEANS TO SOLVE THOSE PROBLEMS. THE ENERGETIC APPLICATION OF THIS EXTENSIVE KNOWLEDGE HAS MATERIALLY CONTRIBUTED TO THE EFFORTS OF THE UNITED STATES MISSION TO THE REPUBLIC OF VIETNAM TO ASSIST THAT COUNTRY IN RIDDING ITSELF OF THE COMMUNIST THREAT TO ITS FREEDOM. HIS INITIATIVE, ZEAL, SOUND JUDGMENT AND DEVOTION TO DUTY HAVE BEEN IN THE HIGHEST TRADITION OF THE UNITED STATES ARMY AND REFLECT GREAT CREDIT ON HIM AND ON THE MILITARY SERVICE.
