Tom Otte was drafted into the U.S. Army in 1966 and received his Basic Combat and Advanced Individual Training with Charlie Company, 1st Battalion (Mechanized), 50th Infantry at Fort Hood Texas beginning in the Fall of 1966 until the Spring of 1967 when he was transferred to the 1st Battalion, 52nd Infantry which was destined to join the newly formed 198th Light Infantry Brigade in Vietnam.

Just weeks after his transfer, the 1st Battalion, 50th Infantry also received notice that they would deploy to Vietnam...leaving Oakland, California via the USS General John Pope on September 1st of 1967. Tom's new unit followed and also departed from Oakland on the Pope's Sister ship, the USS General W. H. Gordon which departed on October 6, 1967, passing underneath the Golden Gate Bridge and sailing to Subic Bay, Philippines, a trip that took 19 days. 2



days later, they arrived at Da Nang Harbor in Vietnam where they transferred to LSTs for transport down the coast, arriving at Chu Lai in Southern I Corps Tactical Zone on October 26, 1967.

Now Private First Class Otte participated in two Campaigns in Vietnam: The Counteroffensive, Phase III and the Tet Counteroffensive.

During the overnight hours of February 3rd, Tom Otte's 2nd Platoon, Company C. was temporarily under the **Operational Control of the 1st** Battalion, 46th Infantry and was set up in a U-shaped Ambush near a jungle trail just inside Binh **Dinh Province...Ironically...just 35** miles north of his former training unit from Texas, the 1st Bn, 50th Infantry who was operating near **Bong Son in Northern II Corps** Tactical Zone.

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At approximately 5:35 AM, while the platoon was on "50% Alert (half the men awake and half sleeping) a member of the ambush team woke up and shouted "Here they come" and started firing with his M16, wounding three men from his own squad. There were no enemy soldiers involved and 2 of the wounded, Tom Otte and Bob Dickson died of their wounds while the third man, PFC Eames, survived.

The incident occurred in the days following the Tet Offensive of January 30, 1968, and throughout Vietnam, "Mop-up" operations were seeing heavy contact in the jungles of South Vietnam as badly defeated VC forces attempted to melt into the jungle and regroup. Tensions were high and infantry units were on edge from days of heavy contact.

Tom Otte is fondly remembered by the men from Charlie Company, 1st Battalion, 50th Infantry including Dick Vanderloop, also from Corporal Otte's hometown of Kaukauna, WI.
