The incident where Steven Owen was initially wounded was an ambush on May 30, 1969. An enemy Claymore Mine was detonated as his Scout Platoon, Point Element moved out, heading North, from a small village they had just swept in a search operation. Seven soldiers were dusted off via Med-Evac helicopter, 2 of whom were killed...Virgil Hamilton was killed outright and Jerome Collins died of his wounds shortly after. Of the 5 others who were wounded, Steven Owen died the next day of his wounds.

The remaining Scout Platoon elements fired on two Viet Cong to the Southwest, killing one and capturing the 2nd. The 50th Infantry's Short Range Ambush Platoon (SRAP) moved two of their machine gun equipped boats into a blocking position on the nearby Lake Dam Tra O to cut off the lake as an escape route. The SRAP elements received 4 or 5 rounds of sniper fire from the West with no casualties and returned fire with unknown results. A second adult male with no ID was detained and removed for questioning. *Although most "official" documentation still lists the province of his death as Quang Ngai, he died of wounds received in Binh Dinh Province. This is a common error...as men were often listed in the province where they were located when they actually died...and we can "assume" he was at a hospital in Quang Ngai Province.



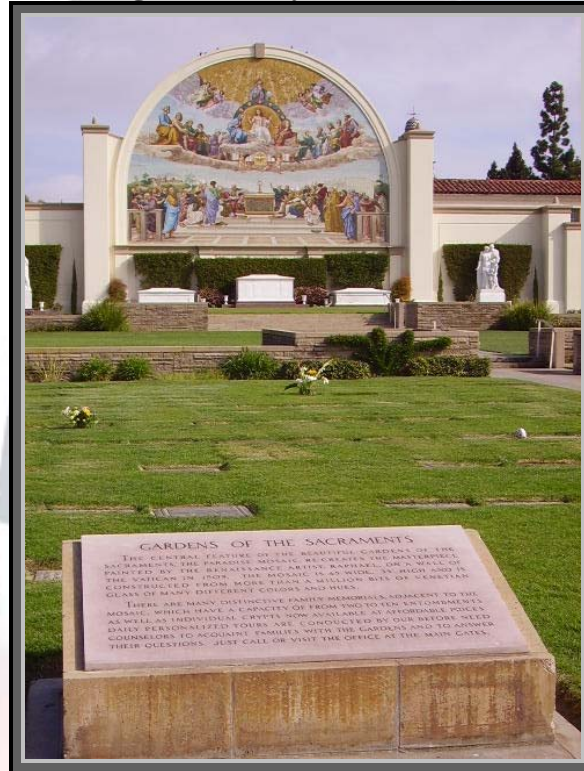
A map of the location where Hamilton, Collins and Owen were killed is shown below:



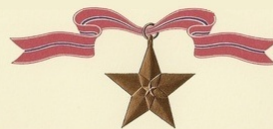
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Steve Owen's mother, Trudy Potter of California, shared with us that her son was drawn to volunteer for service and sought out duty in Vietnam...stating: "He said if he didn't go, someone else would have to". In keeping with his desire to serve his country in Combat, even though he was a Clerk Typist by specialty, he was an active Volunteer with the scout Platoon. He is fondly remembered by Association Member and former Scout Platoon Member Terry "Goat" Gauthier of Mississippi.

Steve is buried at Forest Lawn Memorial Parl, also known as Sunnyside Memorial Park and Mausoleum, 1500 E. San Antonio, Long Beach, Los Angeles County, California.

SPECIALIST 5 STEVEN OWEN DISTINGUISHED HIMSELF BY OUTSTANDING MERITORIOUS SERVICE IN CONNECTION WITH GROUND OPERATIONS AGAINST A HOSTILE FORCE IN THE REPUBLIC OF VIETNAM DURING THE PERIOD FROM JANUARY TO MAY 1969. THROUGH HIS UNTIRING EFFORTS AND PROFESSIONAL ABILITY, HE CONSISTENTLY OBTAINED OUTSTANDING RESULTS. HE WAS QUICK TO GRASP THE IMPLICATIONS OF NEW PROBLEMS WITH WHICH HE WAS FACED AS A RESULT OF THE EVER-CHANGING SITUATIONS INHERENT IN THE COUNTERINSURGENCY OPERATION AND TO FIND WAYS AND MEANS TO SOLVE THOSE PROBLEMS. THE ENERGETIC APPLICATION OF THIS EXTENSIVE KNOWLEDGE HAS MATERIALLY CONTRIBUTED TO THE EFFORTS OF THE UNITED STATES MISSION TO THE REPUBLIC OF VIETNAM TO ASSIST THAT COUNTRY IN RIDDING ITSELF OF THE COMMUNIST THREAT TO ITS FREEDOM.
