

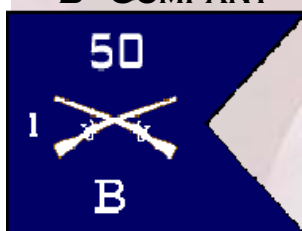

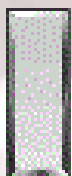

## HOWARD SAMUEL PONTUCK

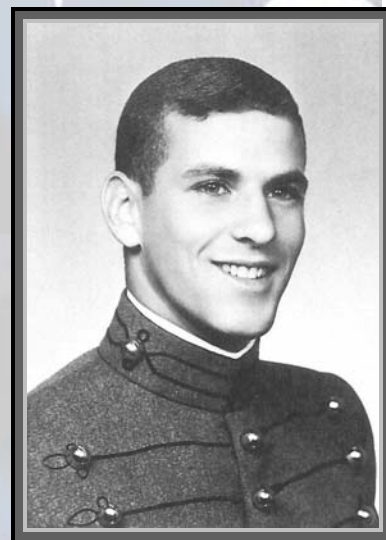
Howard Pontuck was a graduate of West Point...a member of the class of 1966...which gained distinction as having the most members killed in action than any other class involved with the Vietnam war.

He briefly commanded Company B of the 1st Battalion (Mechanized), 50th Infantry at Fort Hood, Texas before the battalion deployed to Vietnam. He was replaced in that capacity by then Captain Richard Guthrie.

Once in Vietnam, Lieutenant Pontuck was not one to be kept back in the rear area...as should have been his lot as Executive Officer. At every opportunity, he was in the field with the troops.

He distinguished himself in battle at the villages of An Lac and An Tinh in early January of 1968 and was awarded the Bronze Star for Valor.

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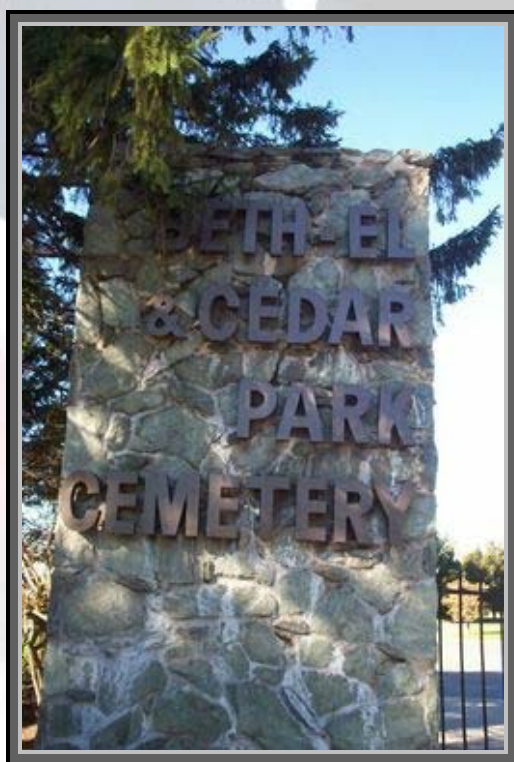
Howard Pontuck wanted to move to MACV...where he felt he could be of better use to the war effort. He finally got his wish and was transferred to an area near Can Tho in the Mekong Delta

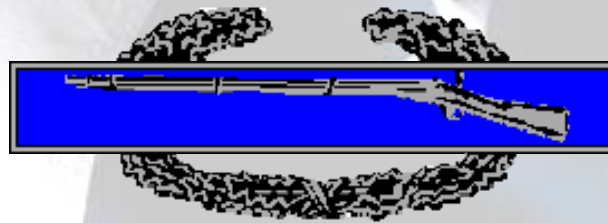

### THE BRONZE STAR MEDAL WITH "V" DEVICE FOR VALOR

HQ 1ST CAVALRY DIVISION (AIRMOBILE), GENERAL ORDERS NUMBER 2076, 9 APRIL  
1968

FOR HEROISM, NOT INVOLVING PARTICIPATION IN AERIAL FLIGHT, IN CONNECTION WITH MILITARY OPERATIONS AGAINST A HOSTILE FORCE IN THE REPUBLIC OF VIETNAM: FIRST LIEUTENANT PONTUCK DISTINGUISHED HIMSELF BY EXCEPTIONALLY VALOROUS ACTIONS ON 2 JANUARY 1968, WHILE SERVING AS EXECUTIVE OFFICER WITH COMPANY B, 1ST BATTALION (MECHANIZED), 50TH INFANTRY DURING A SEARCH AND CLEAR MISSION NEAR AN LAC, REPUBLIC OF VIETNAM. WHEN HIS UNIT BECAME HEAVILY ENGAGED WITH A LARGE ENEMY FORCE AND SUSTAINED SEVERAL CASUALTIES, LIEUTENANT PONTUCK EXPOSED HIMSELF TO THE ENEMY FIRE AS HE MOVED THROUGH AN OPEN AREA TO ASSIST HIS WOUNDED COMRADES. DISREGARDING HIS OWN SAFETY, HE THEN MOVED THE INJURED MEN TO COVERED POSITIONS. HIS DISPLAY OF PERSONAL BRAVERY AND DEVOTION TO DUTY WAS IN KEEPING WITH THE HIGHEST TRADITIONS OF THE MILITARY SERVICE AND REFLECTS GREAT CREDIT UPON HIMSELF, HIS UNIT, AND THE UNITED STATES ARMY.
