

During the fierce fighting that ensued at the outset of the Tet Offensive near Phu My in Binh Dinh Province, "D" Company came into contact with a large enemy force Northeast of Phu My and to the East of the villages of Tan An (See map below). An enemy grenade took Melvin Williams' life in the fighting. Also killed during the battle was Specialist Dave Parker with "D" Company's Heavy Weapons Platoon.

The action lasted from January 31st through February 4th and was part of "Operation Pershing II". Enemy forces lost (By Body Count) 139 killed during the action while U.S. forces suffered 4 dead. To read the After Action Report for the action go to:

GENERAL ORDERS NUMBER 1637

19 March 1968

FOR HEROISM, NOT INVOLVING PARTICIPATION IN AERIAL FLIGHT, IN CONNECTION WITH MILITARY OPERATIONS AGAINST A HOSTILE FORCE IN THE REPUBLIC OF VIETNAM: PRIVATE FIRST CLASS WILLIAMS DISTINGUISHED HIMSELF BY EXCEPTIONALLY VALOROUS ACTIONS ON 31 JANUARY 1968, WHILE SERVING AS A RIFLEMAN WITH COMPANY D, 1ST BATTALION (MECHANIZED), 5OTH INFANTRY DURING A SEARCH AND CLEAR MISSION NEAR TAN AN, REPUBLIC OF VIETNAM. WHEN HIS UNIT BECAME HEAVILY ENGAGED WITH A LARGE ENEMY FORCE, PRIVATE FIRST CLASS WILLIAMS EXPOSED HIMSELF TO THE HOSTILE FIRE AS HE ATTEMPTED TO ASIST A WOUNDED COMRADE. WHILE MOVING FORWARD IN AN ATTEMPT TO REACH THE INJURED SOLDIER, PRIVATE FIRST CLASS WILLIAMS WAS MORTALLY WOUNDED. HIS DISPLAY OF PERSONAL BRAVERY AND DEVOTION TO DUTY WAS IN KEEPING WITH THE HIGHEST TRADITIONS OF THE MILITARY SERVICE AND REFLECTS GREAT CREDIT UPON HIMSELF, HIS UNIT, AND THE UNITED STATES ARMY.
