

General Orders Number 485 20 January 1968

FOR HEROISM, NOT INVOLVING PARTICIPATION IN AERIAL FLIGHT, IN CONNECTION WITH MILITARY OPERATIONS AGAINST A HOSTILE FORCE IN THE REPUBLIC OF VIETNAM:

SPECIALIST FOUR ROSEBROOK DISTINGUISHED HIMSELF BY EXCEPTIONALLY VALOROUS ACTION ON 31 OCTOBER 1967, WHILE SERVING AS A SQUAD LEADER WITH COMPANY C, 1ST BATTALION (MECHANIZED), 50TH INFANTRY DURING A NIGHT PERIMETER DEFENSE NEAR QUANG NGHIÊM, REPUBLIC OF VIETNAM.

WHEN HIS UNIT CAME UNDER INTENSE HOSTILE FIRE, SPECIALIST ROSEBROOK EXPOSED HIMSELF TO THE ENEMY FIRE AS HE POSITIONED HIS MEN INTO PROPER DEFENSIVE POSITIONS AND DIRECTED THEIR FIRE AGAINST THE ENEMY FORCE. AS THE ENEMY SOLDIERS GOT TO WITHIN FIVE METERS OF HIS POSITION, SPECIALIST ROSEBROOK STOOD UP AND THREW A HAND GRENADE. HIS ACTION CONTRIBUTED GREATLY TO THE SUCCESSFUL REPULSION OF THE ENEMY ATTACK.

HIS DISPLAY OF PERSONAL BRAVERY AND DEVOTION TO DUTY IS IN KEEPING WITH THE HIGHEST TRADITION S OF THE MILITARY SERVICE AND REFLECTS GREAT CREDIT ON HIMSELF, HIS UNIT, AND THE UNITED STATES ARMY.
