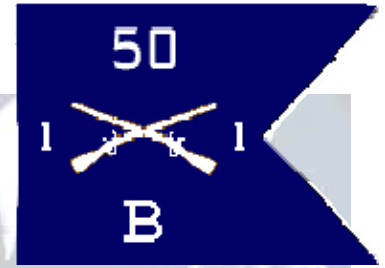




**1ST BATTALION (MECHANIZED), 50TH

Former First Lieutenant James L. Wonsick was Platoon leader with the Mortar Platoon of "B" Company, 1st Battalion (Mechanized), 50th Infantry in 1967 and moved to the 1st Platoon as Platoon Leader in December of that year.

Jim Wonsick received many awards and decorations during his service with the 50th Infantry, the highest of which was the award of the Bronze Star with "V" Device for Valor for his actions during what became known as the Battle of An Tinh (An Lac)...specifically during the "B" Company contact with elements of the 22nd NVA Regiment near the villages of An Tinh and An Lac on the coastal beach area south of Bong Son in Binh Dinh Province on January 2nd, 1968.

WONSICK James L. Wonsick, age 65 of Canal Winchester, went home to be with the Lord on Friday, September 28, 2012. He was born February 21, 1947 in Columbus to the late James P. and Helen L. 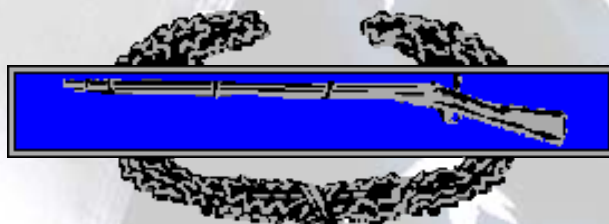

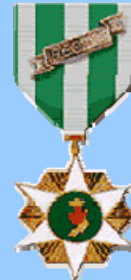

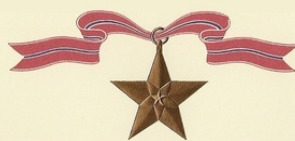

WITH "V" DEVICE FOR VALOR

HQ, 1ST CAVALRY DIVISION (AIRMOBILE)

GENERAL ORDERS NUMBER 1772

22 MARCH, 1968

FOR HEROISM, NOT INVOLVING PARTICIPATION IN AERIAL FLIGHT, IN CONNECTION WITH MILITARY OPERATIONS AGAINST A HOSTILE FORCE IN THE REPUBLIC OF VIETNAM. SECOND LIEUTENANT WONSICK DISTINGUISHED HIMSELF BY EXCEPTIONALLY VALOROUS ACTION ON 2 JANUARY 1968, WHILE SERVING AS A PLATOON LEADER WITH COMPANY B, 1ST BATTALION (MECHANIZED), 50TH INFANTRY DURING A SEARCH AND CLEAR MISSION NEAR AN LAC, REPUBLIC OF VIETNAM. WHEN HIS UNIT BECAME HEAVILY ENGAGED WITH A LARGE ENEMY FORCE, LIEUTENANT WONSICK SUSTAINED A SERIOUS WOUND, BUT CONTINUED TO LEAD HIS PLATOON AGAINST THE HOSTILE EMPLACEMENTS. CONTINUALLY EXPOSING HIMSELF TO THE ENEMY FIRE, LIEUTENANT WONSICK DISMOUNTED HIS VEHICLE TO COORDINATE HIS UNIT'S BASE OF AGAINST THE ENEMY POSITIONS. HIS DISPLAY OF PERSONAL BRAVERY AND DEVOTION TO DUTY WAS IN KEEPING WITH THE HIGHEST TRADITIONS OF THE MILITARY SERVICE AND REFLECTS GREAT CREDIT UPON HIMSELF, HIS UNIT, AND THE UNITED STATES ARMY.
