French Thank You

By: Birchpond, Submitted by: Dick Guthrie 9,000 Fallen Soldiers Etched into the Sand on Normandy Beach to Commemorate Peace Day September 25, 2013

Our politicians can close the Memorials to WWII but the French in Normandy can still pay tribute to those who gave their lives for Freedom.

British artists Jamie Wardley and Andy Moss accompanied by numerous volunteers, took to the beaches of Normandy with rakes and stencils in hand to etch 9,000 silhouettes representing fallen people into the sand. Titled The Fallen 9000, the piece is meant as a stark visual reminder of the civilians, Germans and allied forces who died during the D-Day beach landings at Arromanches on June 6, 1944 during WWII. The original team consisted of 60 volunteers, but as word spread nearly 500 additional local residents arrived to help with the temporary installation that lasted only a few hours before being washed away by the tide.

WATER, MEDICAL AND EDUCATIONAL PROJECTS IN THE BATTALIONS OLD AO'S

In the late 1970's, Terry Goodwin (Bravo company) watched a network news cast of Cambodian refugees fleeing for their lives from the Khmer Rouge into refugee camps in Thailand. There a missionary nurse asked a young mother with a malnourished dying daughter if she had a duck egg to feed her child to save her life. The mothers answer was no she had nothing to give her child ...not even an egg. You could see the despair on the nurse's and mothers face and the news cast ended.

This egg story became an inspiration to Terry and through prayer, God impressed on him to "do something". After a survey trip to Mali, West Africa, and witnessing firsthand the dire need for water, Terry's heart was stirred once more and in 1988 Our Mission Inc. was born digging village water wells, medical and educational projects in Burkina Faso, Gabon, Guinea and Mali West Africa. The primary focus initially was on village water wells in West Africa but opportunity opened up that Our Mission was able to refurbish three rural medical clinics, fund the Smile project and purchased rice for flood victims in the northern part of Vietnam.

Terry focused on the possibility of funding projects in his battalions old AO's and in early 2011 contacted SOMEDCO and from this contact Our Mission has funded the following:

- Dam Tra lake area 2 village biological sand water filters. In other provinces 4 filters. Cost: \$1200.00 each.
- •Bong Son, Phu My and AnKhe, Mobile Medical Clinic. Cost: \$3000.00 for a 2 day clinic.
- In and around Phu Phong (half way on Hwy 19 between Quy Nhon and AnKhe), we have an Education sponsorship of 30 students. Cost: \$10.00 per month per student (\$120.00 year) we need 13 more sponsors.

•Mountains SE of Da Nang (Montanyard) and in the Mekong Delta Sawyer water filter projects implemented. Cost: \$65.00 per filter. Producing three hundred gallons plus of uncontaminated water daily from each filter.

In 2011 Our Mission Inc. became Our Mission, a ministry of the Christian Alliance Church, 1609 Conwell Ave. Willard, Ohio. 100% of all funds received go toward the projects and donations are tax deductible. 
HISTORIAN REPORT - NOVEMBER 2013

My historian effort continues to be centered on our memorial pages for all of our men killed in action.

For the past 3 years, I have been methodically updating these pages with Award orders obtained from the National Archives. Last summer I joined forces with Tom Kjos (Writing a book on the Battle of Tam Quan) once again and managed to obtain an additional 100 General Orders from the period between December, 1967, and the summer of 1968.

All these updates are nearly complete and I will then be concentrating my efforts on adding memorial pages for those men belonging to 50th Infantry units that were not a part of our Battalion. Some of these additions have already been completed, but there remains another 2 dozen or so to be completed.





My efforts with these memorial pages have included acquisition of a photo for each man. We currently have photos of all but 21 of our men...although there are about 8 photos that are of a very poor quality. Most of the obvious sources for these photos have been visited countless times...particularly the Vietnam Veterans Memorial Find Website, which has a drive on it to obtain photos.

Last year, I traveled extensively through some of our Southeastern states in this quest. It seems that the best way to find these precious photos is to get right in where the man lived and find where he went to school...and locate his surviving family members.

Just this past weekend, I travelled to South Carolina to research our "B" Company man Robert McMillin. The trip was a success as I obtained his photo from a very helpful Boiling Springs High School Administrator, Debbie Saey. She also put me on the phone with her husband...who had known our ma. Later that same day, I spoke with our man's brother and will be sending his family our memorial information and invite them to our next wreath laying event in 2015. A visit to the cemetery where our man was buried ended the research for the day.
