

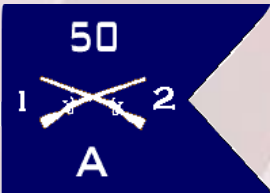

## JAMES CLINTON STRANO

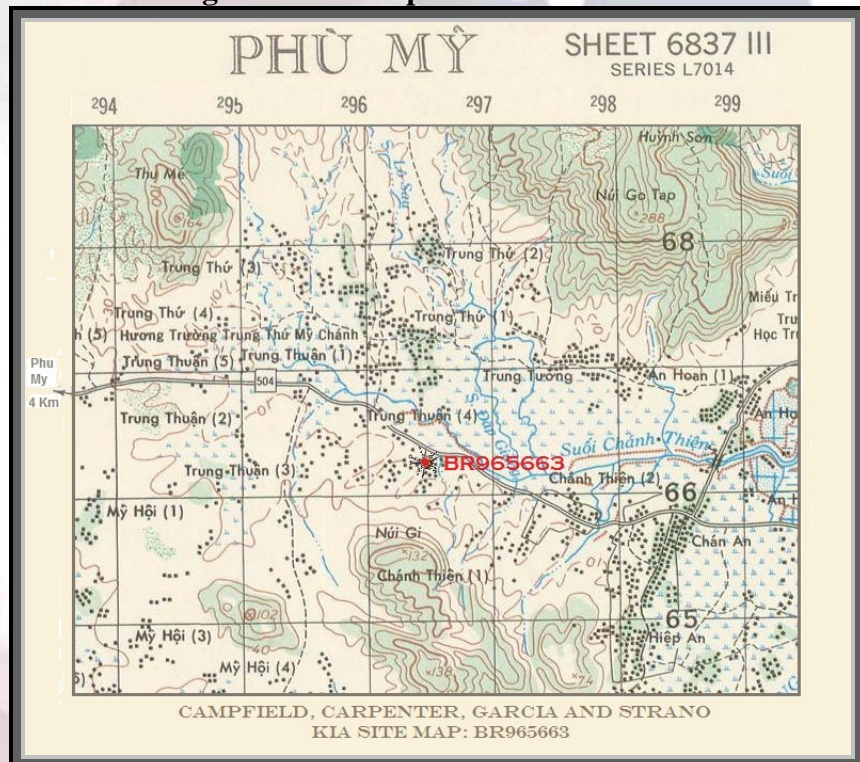
2nd Platoon, "A" Company, 1<sup>st</sup> Battalion (Mechanized), 50<sup>th</sup> Infantry  
Private First Class, E3, Posthumous Promotion to CPL, US52722526, MOS 11C20

During the weeks prior to the 1968 Tet Offensive, the 1st Battalion (Mechanized), 50th Infantry began to "bump heads" with various North Vietnamese Army units...most notably in December with the Battle of Tam Quan. January saw this trend continue with more major contacts at An Tinh / An Lac (2) and Trung Thuan.

James Strano, Albert Campfield, Tommy Lee Carpenter and Emilio Garcia were killed as our "A" Company moved to counter-attack the elements of the 95th Battalion, 2nd VC/NVA Regiment, 3rd NVA Division who were attacking the Popular Force outpost at Chan An. A captured enemy soldier revealed that the main force of the enemy Battalion lay in Ambush on the approaches to Chan An on Highway 504. "A" Company made immediate contact on the highway as they closed on Trung Thuan...just west of the Popular Forces outpost. The enemy took very heavy casualties throughout the day long battle. Even after having the cover of darkness to secret away dead bodies, 137 NVA/VC bodies were found left on the battlefield in the morning of January 24th. In addition, 33 weapons were captured.

James Strano was awarded the Bronze Star with "V" Device (For Valor) for his bravery in battle at Trung Thuan. A map of the location is shown below.



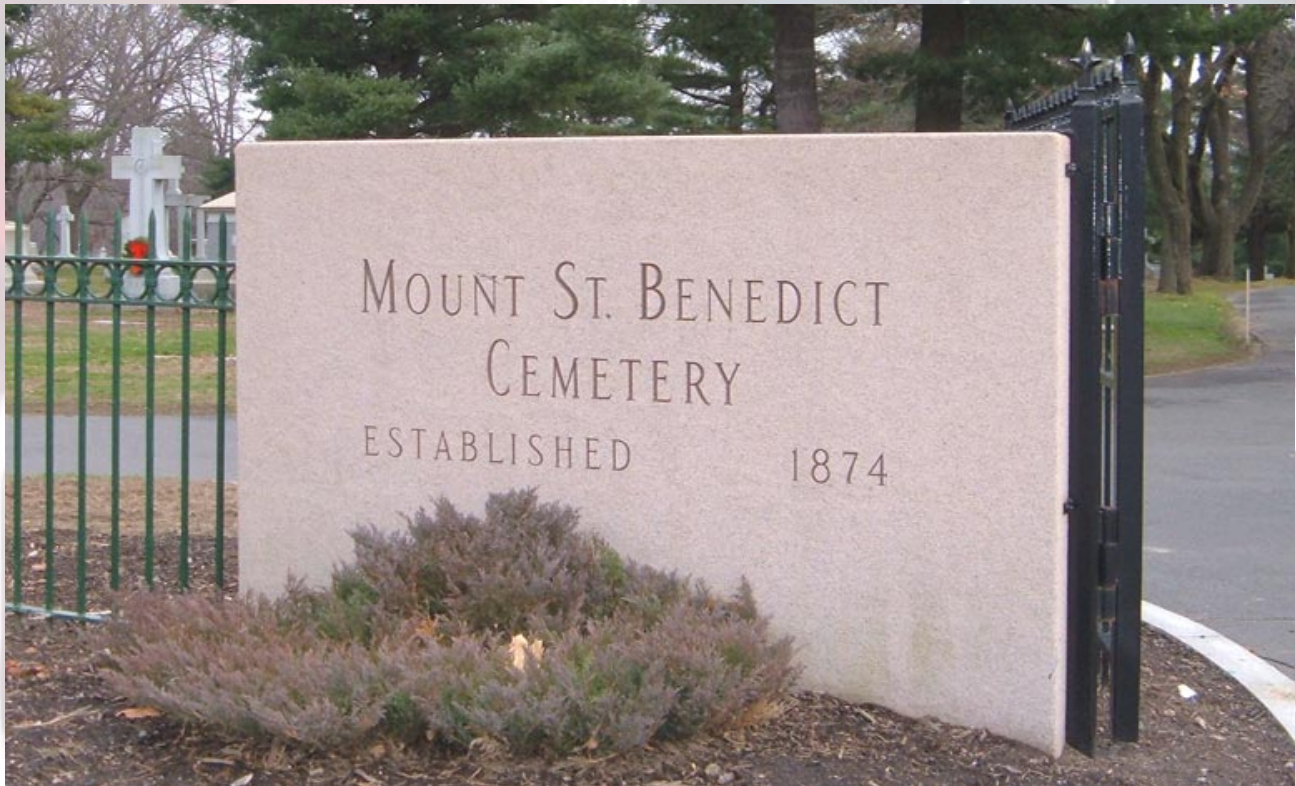

## JAMES STRANO'S AWARDS AND DECORATIONS

THE BRONZE STAR MEDAL  
WITH "V" DEVICE FOR VALOR

HQ, 1ST CAVALRY DIVISION (AIRMOBILE)

GENERAL ORDERS NUMBER 14936

14 MARCH, 1968

FOR HEROISM, NOT INVOLVING PARTICIPATION IN AERIAL FLIGHT, IN CONNECTION WITH MILITARY OPERATIONS AGAINST A HOSTILE FORCE IN THE REPUBLIC OF VIETNAM. PRIVATE FIRST CLASS STRANO DISTINGUISHED HIMSELF BY EXCEPTIONALLY VALOROUS ACTION ON 23 JANUARY 1968, WHILE SERVING AS A RIFLEMAN WITH COMPANY A, 1ST BATTALION (MECHANIZED), 50TH INFANTRY DURING A COMBAT MISSION IN THE REPUBLIC OF VIETNAM. WHEN HIS UNIT CAME UNDER INTENSE HOSTILE FIRE, PRIVATE FIRST CLASS STRANO EXPOSED HIMSELF TO THE ENEMY FIRE AS HE FLANKED THE HOSTILE POSITIONS IN AN ATTEMPT TO DESTROY THE WELL ENTRENCHED HOSTILE FORCE. AFTER NEUTRALIZING ONE ENEMY EMPLACEMENT, PRIVATE FIRST CLASS STRANO WAS MORTALLY WOUNDED UPON NEUTRALIZING AN ENEMY FORTIFICATION, SERGEANT CARPENTER WAS MORTALLY WOUNDED. HIS DISPLAY OF PERSONAL BRAVERY AND DEVOTION TO DUTY WAS IN KEEPING WITH THE HIGHEST TRADITIONS OF THE MILITARY SERVICE AND REFLECTS GREAT CREDIT UPON HIMSELF, HIS UNIT, AND THE UNITED STATES ARMY.
