A 1968 Occurrence Revisited in 2021

DOCTOR'S VISIT

You have all had x-rays on various parts of your body over the years and I like, have had numerous as well. With that thought in mind, I'm relating an experience at my doctor's office that is connected to an incident at LZ Uplift in late May or early June 1968.

Since I have sleep apnea and must see the doctor twice per year. I happened to be there for my biannual visit and for this visit, the doctor had ordered an x-ray of my chest and ENT area.

After completing the obligatory 2 x-ray photos and looking at the results, the Technician approaches me and says, "Mr. Melendez you seem to have a small piece of metal embedded in the lower left side of your chest." I responded to her by saying yes that it was true and that I was aware of the piece of metal in my chest and when she asked about the circumstances of the incident, I proceeded to describe the events below. But I did so in a <u>very short summarized manner</u> as I thought that she would not understand our lexicon. The details of the account below are directed to my Mortar Platoon guys (you know who you are).

INCIDENT:

"Well Ma'am, I spent the first 4 months of 1968 as the platoon medic for the delta Company Mortar Platoon. Since Delta saw some serious action during those 4 months, I naturally grew close to the members of the 'Four-Deuce' platoon as we endured and survived those harrowing incidences.

After the May 5th Battle of An Bao, I was transferred from the Delta Mortar Platoon to Alpha Company. On the occasions when Alpha would 'stand down' for a day or two at LZ Uplift I would usually go and bunk with my former Mortar buddies. (By this time, the Delta Mortar platoon had been permanently stationed at Uplift.)

On one particular 'stand down' I not only bunked with my Mortar buddies but got up at 2:00 am to watch their scheduled 'H and I' fire. After my shift concluded I returned to my bunk and had not been asleep for long when a HUGE explosion occurred and it seemed really, really close. We instantly assumed a mortar attack. I rushed to the Mortar Pit and found that a mortar round had exploded just after clearing the tube. Tragically one man was killed instantly (a new guy, I think) and another had a compound wound in the upper thigh (if I recall that it was Bernard Bierman).

After evacuation the KIA/WIA and clearing the debris away, I returned to my temporary bunk and as I pulled my shirt off, I noticed there was a small trickle of blood from the lower left side of my chest. A very small cut was there and I think I remember that could feel the metal just below the skin surface. And that Ma'am, is how the metal got into my chest: also, I find it amazing that you're the first technician to have mentioned it while all the others have not."

(The area never hurts and the metal seems to have moved deeper: or maybe it's the muscle that I added in that area over the years. OK, okay maybe it's not muscle so it must be fat.)

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A Historians Thoughts

In his second novel, <u>A Farewell to Arms</u>, Hemingway wrote the following passage, a stark critique of war and those who laud it:

"I was always embarrassed by the words sacred, glorious, and sacrifice. . . . We had heard them, sometimes standing in the rain almost out of earshot, so that only the shouted words came through, and had read them, on proclamations that were slapped up by billposters over other proclamations, now for a long time, and I had seen nothing sacred, and the things that were glorious had no glory and the sacrifices were like the stockyards at Chicago if nothing was done with the meat except to bury it. There were many words that you could not stand to hear and finally only the names of places had dignity. Certain numbers were the same way and certain dates and these with the names of the places were all you could say and have them mean anything. Abstract words such as glory, honor, courage, or hallow were obscene beside the concrete names of villages, the numbers of roads, the names of rivers, the numbers of regiments and the dates."

I was stunned by these words.

As Historian and proprietor of my Vietnam infantry unit's association archives and website, the later, within which you can find memorial pages for over 200 men who died in Vietnam as members of the various units of our Regiment, I was suddenly struck by the truth of the legendary authors words.

Putting together the details of all those deaths...a large majority of whom were teenaged men...struck down in their youth, leaving a multitude of sadness in so many lives, left my views on that war many years ago shaken and changed.

Of course, we gather and remember. We remember the names of those we lost...the villages, the base camps, the experiences...good and bad, and we are now, after many years of distain or indifference to our dutiful service to our country by those who did not experience the horrors of war...are often greeted with "Thank you for your service".

It was a long time coming...and quite disconcerting the first times we heard this greeting, but I now believe it a fitting legacy...and a now meaningful "salute" to those who have fought in all wars since "our war".
