From LTC Daubert

The active duty arm of the 1-50IN is doing well. CSM Bell and I are proud every day when watching your Drill Sergeants and Cadre transform civilians into Infantry Soldiers. It is an understatement to say that they are truly awesome trainers.

A central theme for the last several months is summarized in one word...TRANSITION. Based on the constant arrival and departure of personnel, the Battalion is in a constant state of leader transition and change. Since the last newsletter we have new leaders serving in the critical positions of Company Commander and First Sergeant for many of the companies.

When operating in the constant state of transition and change, success is enabled by established systems and processes. The Battalion Executive Officer (MAJ Wampler) is working hard to make a Battalion level SOP (standard operating procedure) a reality. This seminal living document allows for critical documents to be accessible by all cadre. The result is that this buys down the time it takes one of our instructors to become an expert at what they teach once they join the team.

We currently have three companies in training. Delta Company's execution of their pickup, now call the 1st 100 Yards, was filmed by Business Insider. This was made into an 11:18 video that is on YouTube and at the link below.

This video shows the culture change that has occurred within the Battalion and all of OSUT (One Station Unit Training) at Fort Benning. It is an event now based on inclusion, winning, and teamwork from day one. Don't be mistaken, it is as difficult and challenging as ever. The Brigade Commander and Command Sergeant Major recognized the Battalion's execution of this event as the standard for which all others will be measured. This is a testament to the professionalism and pride of all YOUR cadre.

A third area of focus is the upcoming execution of a Battalion level Mungadi leader event. This will be a 36+ hour event that all Lieutenants and Captains will be stressed through constant physical and mental events. At the end of this event, each will earn their 50th Infantry Regiment crossed rifles.

Richard, (my husband), never really talked a lot about his time in Viet Nam other than he had been shot by a sniper. However, he had a rather grainy, 8x10 black & white photo he had taken at a USO show of Ann Margaret with Bob Hope in the background that was one of his treasures.

A few years ago, Ann Margaret was doing a book signing at a local bookstore. Richard wanted to see if he could get her to sign the treasured photo so he arrived at the bookstore at 12 o'clock for the 7:30 signing. When I got there after work, the line went all the way around the bookstore, circled the parking lot, and disappeared behind a parking garage.

Before her appearance, bookstore employees announced that she would sign only her book and no memorabilia would be permitted. Richard was disappointed, but wanted to show her the photo and let her know how much those shows meant to lonely GI's so far from home.

Ann Margaret came out looking as beautiful as ever and, as second in line, it was soon Richard's turn. He presented the book for her signature and then took out the photo. When he did, there were many shouts from the employees that she would not sign it. Richard said, "I understand. I just wanted her to see it".

She took one look at the photo, tears welled up in her eyes and she said, "This is one of my gentlemen from Viet Nam and I most certainly will sign his photo. I know what these men did for their country and I always have time for "my gentlemen". With that, she pulled Richard across the table and planted a big kiss on him. She then made quite a to do about the bravery of the young men she met over the years, how much she admired them, and how much she appreciated them. There weren't too many dry eyes among those close enough to hear. She then posed for pictures and acted as if he was the only one there.

Later at dinner, Richard was very quiet. When I asked if he'd like to talk about it, my big strong husband broke down in tears. "That's the first time anyone ever thanked me for my time in the Army", he said.
