A humbling experience for all of these veterans!

The next morning, upon arrival at the 1/50th headquarters, the veterans were again, recognized and thanked for their service and gifted with pins, commemorating the 50th Anniversary of the unit's deployment to Vietnam. A Memorial dedication was held, where a monument was unveiled. The monument recognized the fallen soldiers of the 1/50th who lost their lives in battles in Vietnam. At this time, family members of some of men who died in Vietnam were recognized and presented plaques that recognized their loved ones for their service and ultimate sacrifice to this country.

This is only a few of the activities from this week, but these were the most memorable and humbling for me, as well as all of the veterans and guests.

I just wanted to take this time to thank everyone who worked so hard to make this event happen. I am looking THANK to the next reunion on 2017.
