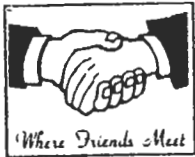

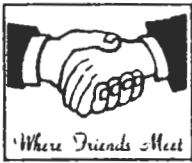

Yes Gentlemen: This is a real event! I have had many questions thrown my way about this and yes, we are indeed selling tickets for a "Cow Pie Raffle". For those of you who have already ordered and paid for your tickets, I thank you very much for your support, and want to just remind you to please send the signed stubs back to me now. I also wish you all Good Luck. For those of you who did not order any tickets,... an Article 15 to you! Order your tickets now, before you forget!

As of today's date: (the date on the newsletter of course):

Tickets bought and paid for: 958

Tickets ordered to be sold: 296

Tickets left to sell: 1,746

This event started with the January Newsletter, released on the 30th of January. So, even though only two months have gone by, I think we can all pat ourselves on the back for selling so many tickets in this short period. However, this does not mean we can sit on our duff the rest of the time. There are still a lot of tickets to be sold.

As I stated in the previous newsletter, the money raised goes to help defray costs at the reunions. Also, I personally would like to see a "Flower and Card" Fund set up during the Reunion Meeting to provide those items to any ill, or sick members of the Association or their families. I would like to see someone volunteer as our "Hospital" man. His duties would be to keep track of ill members and send cards.

The tickets are only \$2.00 each or a book of six (6) for \$10.00. The prize money is as follows:

2,000 tickets sold: \$2,000.00

The seller of the winning ticket will receive \$150.00 for his efforts. The person selling the most tickets will get \$150.00 for his efforts. (nice number,... that 150, huh?)

Those of you who have already ordered tickets for your own use, or to sell,... Remember, I need the stub on the ticket filled out and sent back to me as soon as possible, so I can get your numbers listed on the chart which will be used at the actual event. Don't delay on this, or your numbers may not get onto the chart in time.

To give you an idea of some of the cost involved with this reunion, the bus trips set up for Saturday afternoon and the two buses to take us to dinner on Saturday Night are each \$275.00 for the first 4 hours and \$50.00 each hour thereafter. Plus the bus for Friday's trip to the VFW Headquarters is another \$275.00.

The registration desk will be manned Friday from 3 pm until 7 PM and then on Saturday morning from 10 till 12. The individual badges and other materials required add over \$250.00 to the cost. The hospitality room costs are varied, but the last reunion, I spent over \$150.00 for refreshments and snacks alone. Plus the cost of the room for two evenings. The \$20.00 registration fee does not cover these expenses.

 1ST/50th COW PIE RAFFLE  
 \* \* \* \* \*

The Association is hosting its first ever "Cow Pie" raffle on or about 1 September 1999, (weather permitting), to help raise money to pay for some of our expenses at Kansas City Reunion in September 1999. Here is how it works:

We sell raffle tickets to whomever wants to buy them: friends, family, co-workers, neighbors, etc. Tickets are \$2.00 each or a book of 6 for \$10.00.

Now! How does it work? First, you sell your tickets to anyone you can. Then on the day nearest "D-Day", 1999, an animal will be released into a "designated" field. The field will be divided up into how ever many tickets we sell: (ie: 3000 tickets sold, each square will be about ten square feet).

There will be a minimum of two OBSERVERS in the area of the cow. When the cow makes a "Vertical Insertion", the square the "cow pie" hits will be the official winner. Should it hit on the line between two or four squares, each of those ticket holders will receive a percent of the prize money: (50% for two lines, and 25% if it hits on the corner of the square). The amount of the prize will vary depending on the amount of tickets sold. If we have sales of, say 2000 tickets, the winner(s) will receive \$2,000.00. The person selling the winning ticket will receive \$150.00. Convenient number there, huh?

After expenses for ticket printing, mailing out the tickets, etc., we anticipate raising about \$400.00 for each 1,000 tickets sold. Thus, if we sell 2,000 tickets, we would have \$800.00 to put toward expenses of the reunion. Hopefully, between the registration fee, the money raised in this event, and the "free" stuff I talk National VFW out of, it should not cost us much for the reunion, other than room and travel. At least, it sounds like a plan!

So! The only thing I have to do is convince all of you out there to purchase your tickets, plus tickets to sell to your family, friends, co-workers, neighbors, etc. Open up your hearts and your wallets, and send for your tickets today! Don't wait until June to order tickets, buy them now and get them sold. You can always reorder more. The person selling the most tickets receives a cash prize of \$150.00. There goes that number again. I would love to hand someone a check for \$150.00 at the reunion or send it to the winner.

The Embassy Suites is the hotel at which we will stay. It is downtown Kansas City, on 43rd Street. At this point, I have the hotel holding (100) rooms for us. The room rates are \$109 per night, which is very reasonable for this area for the size room and amenities you receive.

If you plan to attend the reunion and stay overnight, do yourself a favor and give the hotel a call to "book" your room. They will hold 100 rooms open, only until August 1, 1999. After that date, you will be on your own to book wherever you can find accommodations.

I have set up a tour of the National VFW Headquarters in Kansas City for Friday afternoon at 1 PM, for early arrivals. Our hospitality Room will open as soon as Friday night's meeting is over. The room number will be announced at the dinner. Make an effort to drop by sometime during the evening and say Hi!

As I stated in a previous newsletter, there is a \$20.00 registration fee for all Association Members only (not their guests), to help defray some of the costs associated with having a reunion of this size. Please fill in the Registration Form at the end of this newsletter and forward it to me as soon as possible, so we may plan our Friday and Saturday dinner. The hotel WILL charge us (the Association) for the amount of the meals I give to them by the 1st of August, so if you plan on not being there, do not mark the dinner space. Last reunion, we paid for 9 dinners of people who did not come at \$31.25 each. That money came out of Association funds, so please let me know if you will be attending the dinner and meeting as soon as possible.
