Howard "Tooter" Flippin was originally with the 2/41st Mechanized Infantry at Fort Hood. He moved to the 1/50th in the spring of 1967. At Qhuin Nhon, he went with Charlie Company, 4th platoon, on their exploits and tour of the beautiful countryside. Picking up malaria in country, he DEROS in August of 1968. He worked for several railroads (Missouri Pacific, Union Pacific, and the Missouri North Arkansas). He is presently married to his first wife since November 1969, and has two children. He wrote, "I still get excited by helicopters."

The second person I wish to report on is John A Topper, the original Company Commander for Alpha Company. John enlisted in the Army in June 1959, attending OCS in 1964. He was one of the original "boat people," arriving in Vietnam later in September of 1967. He retired in 1993 as Colonel. John and his wife Janet live in Wyoming. Since 1995, He has been Executive Director for the Riverton Community Development Association and for IDEA, Inc. He is a member of the Military Order of the Purple Heart, along with various military Veterans Associations. John was inducted into the United States Army Infantry Hall of Fame in 1986.

1. What were the White Mice?





This article came from Don R Catherall, a Phd. in psychology and co-founder and executive director of the Phoenix institute in Chicago, which specializes in treating trauma survivors of all ages. He has counseled Vietnam Veterans suffering from (PTSD) Post-Traumatic-Stress Disorder and has been an advisor to the Department of Veterans Affairs. He was a combat soldier with the Marine Corps in 1967-1968 and authored "Back from the Brink", a family guide to overcoming traumatic stress. Catherall believes:

Vietnam Veterans are less likely to blindly accept the orders and perceptions of others.

They are perhaps more likely to measure others by reliability, i.e., "Is this someone with whom I could share a foxhole?" They are less hung up on appearances, less easily fooled, and have had enough bullshit thrown at them that they may see through it a little better than others.

"I think we share a sadness and a brotherhood that is rare," says Catherall. "It may not be an active part of our lives most of the time, but Vietnam Vets are able to connect in a way that goes very deep. Think about the guys hugging each other at the Wall. This is the same thing that the current men's movement is trying to achieve, and it's no accident that the foremost group has chosen the name 'Warriors'. I think those of us who were real warriors have found [Iron John] 'wild men' in ourselves."

"We know how to take orders and give orders. We have shared our canteens with all classes of people. We've seen death real close up. We've experienced big-time loss. We've faced our fears and found our own courage. As a result, we are different in a way that the Indians understood and prized, but which our society does not well understand and so often fears. We have had the experience of being judge, jury, and executioner."

"Many of us were free to take life without having to account for our reasons. We were all affected by having that incredible power of living through an experience in which there was no law. We were the law."

Since it will only be a few days before we start gathering at the reunion hotel, please keep in mind that this is a casual affair. You may wear any clothing you wish to bring along, but none of the events are meant to be a "Suit and Gown" affair. Just come and relax and enjoy meeting some of your old friends. I can assure you, you will also meet some new friends there. We have guys coming who closed out our tour of duty in Vietnam at the end of 1970. I want to extend my "WELCOME HOME" to each and every one of you. Please introduce yourself to any person you see at the reunion. Who knows!! It could be a long lost buddy you just don't recognize. 

3. What is the significance of "Nui Chop Dung?"









The date "1959" is engraved on the upper left hand corner of the first panel on the east side of "The Wall." At the lover right corner of the first panel of the west side, we find the date "1975." When the memorial was finish in 1982, some people expressed surprise at those dates. The Vietnam War they thought started in 1964 or 1965 and ended in 1973 with withdrawal of troops following the Paris Peace agreements. Thanks to the efforts of our own historians, nearly everyone knows the origin of the conflict dates much earlier. The truth is, however, that 1959 and 1975 do not even begin to encompass the years of grief brought to American families by the Vietnam War.

On line 1 of the first panel on the east side of "The Wall," two of the names are indeed soldiers who died in 1959. They are Chester N Ovnard from El Reno Ok, and Dale R Buis of Pender NE. Both men were killed on July 8, 1959. But they were not the first Americans killed in Vietnam.

Harry G Cramer was killed nearly two years earlier, on October 21, 1957. His name however appears on line 78. Cramer was a Captain in the Army from Johnstown PA. Johnstown's losses began in 1957 and did not end until 1973, with the death of Kenneth Doyle Scasife. Between those dates, Johnstown PA lost 24 of its sons to the war. With population of Johnstown at 42,000 during that time, Johnstown lost three times the national rate of people to the war.

The last KIA from the Vietnam War is more difficult to determine. Eleven hours before the cease-fire deadline, on January 27, 1973, Lt Colonel William B Nolde was listed as the last US "combat death." However, American personnel continued to die. More than two years after the peace agreement went into effect (May 13, 1975) 25 Air Force lives were lost, and on May 15, 1975, another 18 Americans were killed. On November 8, 1975, Jon O Nacy, an Army PFC from Detroit was killed. November 15, 1981, Major Eddie B Story of Jonesboro TN was added to the list, and the names continue to be added to "The Wall."

The honor of the oldest soldier killed in action goes to Master Sergeant Jimmie Ray Harrison of DeKalb IL, who was born on November 13, 1903 and who died on March 14, 1968, An old soldier who was not content with just fading away.

These names and numbers suggest some of the edges of the Vietnam conflict, but those edges are not nearly as distinct as the edges of other wars. Was it a real war? Who was responsible? When did it begin? The answer to that last question seems to depend on what you mean by "begin." When did it end? Again, the answer is not easy, but the addition of names to "The Wall" since 1982 suggests that "The Wall" is still a work in progress. The better question seems to be "When will it end?"



TIDBITS


